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Dying is part of life



Everyone who lives must also die.



Many people live to a very old age. Sometimes children die too.





People don't have to be alone when they die.

Our hospice service is there for everyone, including you.

Is dying painful?



When people are ill, they sometimes have a lot of pain.



There are doctors who help with the pain.



Medicines can also help against pain.



Visits help too.

Where am I going to die?



Many people want to die at home.



Hospitals have lots of different wards. Including a ward for people who are very ill. That ward is called the Palliative Care Ward.



Many people die in a hospital.



A hospice is a place for very ill people who are going to die. It's their last home and a place where they get lots of help.

What's important to me – if I have to die



What a person wants is important. For example: Who's to be with me when I die?



Some people talk to friends and family about their thoughts. Then they write down their wishes.



You can decide what should happen to you after your death.



Your hospice service team is there to help you. They will listen and answer your questions.

What happens when I'm dead?



Everyone has their own ideas about that.



Many people in the world believe in a god. Some people believe in a life after death, some don't.



Friends and family are often very sad when someone dies. It can help to speak to other people about this.



There are groups called bereavement support groups. In people's thoughts and words you remain alive.
